Come, James, make haste. Now read your book. Here is a pin to point with. Do not tear the book.

I call you in. Will you have a top, or a ball, or a kite to play with? If you have a top you should spin it; if you have a ball, you must toss it; if you have a kite, you ought to fly it.

the milk. Hold the spoon
in your right hand. Do
not throw the bread on the
ground. Bread is made to

eat, and must not waste it.

What are eyes for? -

To see with. What are

ears for? - To hear with.

What is a tongue for? -

To talk with. What are

teeth for? - To eat with.

What is a nose for? - To

smell with. What are

books for? - To learn with.

Look! there is our dog
Tray. He takes good care
of the house and keeps guard
at night, so that no thief
can come in the house. He
will bark, but he will not
bite, if you do not hurt
him. Dogs are kind. Be
kind to him.

You must not hurt live things. You should not kill poor flies, nor pull off their legs nor wings. You must not hurt bees, for they do good, and will not sting you, if you do not touch them.

All things that have life can be feel as well as you can, and should not be hurt.

Try to learn fast. Thank those who teach you. Strive to plain. Speak as if the words were your own. Do not bawl; nor yet speak in too low a voice. Speak so that all in the room may hear you. Read as you talk.

School is out now; come here, Ann. Do you like to swing? All the boys and girls are at play now. They all seem to be glad and full of love, as they ought to be. It is the time to play. We can play if we are good, and learn our tasks well.

Let us take a walk in the fields; and see the sheep, and the lambs, and the cows, and trees and birds. Call Tray. He shall go with us. He wags his tail. He is glad to see us, and to go with us. Stroke poor Tray. Tray likes those who stroke

him, and feed him, and are
kind to him.

Do not walk on the grass
now. It is too high; and it
is quite wit. Walk in this
smooth, dry path. There is
a worm. Do not tread on it.

O what a large field!
This is corn. It will be
ripe soon.

7.

Ducks swim, and geese
swim. Can Charles swim?
No. Charles is not a duck,
nor a goose: so he must take
care not to go too near the
pond, lest he should fall in.

Tom fell in the pond; they
got him out, but he was wit
and cold; and his eyes were

shut; and then he was sick,
and they put him to bed; and
he was long ill and weak,
and could not stand. Why
did he go near the pond?

He had been told not to go, for
fear he should fall in: it
was his own fault, and he
was a bad boy. Mind and
do not do the same.

Jack Hall was a good
boy. He went to school,
and took pains to learn as
he ought. When he was in
school, he kept to his books,
till all his tasks were done;
and then when he came out,
he could play with a good
heart, for he knew that he

had time; and he was so kind,
that all the boys were glad to
play with him.

When he was one of least
boys in the school, he made all
the great boys his friends; and
when he grew a great boy, he
was a friend to all that were
less than he was. He was
not once known to fight, or

to use one of the boys ill, as
long as he staid at school.

Be like Jack Hall, and
you too will gain the love of
all who know you.
