My Dear Ann,

We are in Calcutta,
I have been since the
~~tooth~~¹⁰. Soon we will
start for the further
east, but without any
hope of ever seeing
the Richmond. She
has not passed Suez
yet, and I assume the
ship will decay before



she ever gets back to
America.

We have had a most
pleasant voyage; smooth
sea and balmy weather
to Bombay, and every at-
tention and hospitality
through the interior. I
will tell you only where
we have stopped and say
nothing about impressions.

From Bombay we come
to Jubbulpore, visited the
Marble Rocks, thence to
Allahabad - two days - thence

to Agra. We stayed six
days at Agra; but during
the time visited ^{Jay} Jubbulpore,
an independent province, the
Ancient, but now deserted,
Capital of ^{Jay} Jubbulpore - I
do not just now think
of the name - Berrypore,
another independent state,
the deserted Capital of
Futtipore Begra; Delhi,
Lucknow, Benares and
this place.

The Richmond being so
far behind we will leave
now by the first steamer

going eastward, no matter
whether they go by Madras
or not. I shall regret leav-
ing out Madras & Surlow;
but the season is so far
advanced that we must
take the first steamer.

Mr. Borie is as jolly as a
boy. I think he looks much
improved since we started,
and hope to take him
back to America, a boy
again - in feeling.

Mrs. Grant's love to Mrs.
Ammon, & the numerous
babies, and my kindest
regards.
